# God's Sufficient Grace

2 Corinthians 12:1-10

Introduction: God's Word should always trump your experience.

Deuteronomy 13; Colossians 2:18-19a; 2 Corinthians 11:3-5

He uses sarcasm when he refers to these men as 'super-apostles.'

Ephesians 2:19-20; Revelation 2:2

### Three Marks of an Apostle:

- 1. He had to see the <u>resurrected</u> Lord (Acts 1:21-22; 1 Corinthians 9:1).
- 2. He had to be specially appointed by <u>Christ</u> (Luke 6:12-13; Acts 1:23-26 and Proverbs 16:33).
- 3. He had power to perform <u>miracles</u> (2 Corinthians 12:12; multiple passages in Acts).

2 Corinthians 11:13-15

Key Truth: God wants to use your weaknesses to teach you to humbly rely on Him.

#### **Observations:**

- 1. Personal spiritual experiences do nothing to <u>validate</u> a person's ministry.
- 2. God would not permit Paul to say what he heard.
- 3. God uses Satan's hatred of Paul for Paul's sanctification.
- 4. Christ's power is <u>realized</u> in human suffering and weakness, not visions or revelations.
- 5. When <u>weak</u> people accomplish great things it is obvious that it was God's power at work in them.
- True spiritual strength is the ability to be happily <u>content</u> in the midst of suffering and weakness.

## Three Applications:

1. Pursue Personal Sanctification in <u>Word</u> and <u>Deed</u>, Not Personal Spiritual Experiences

- 3. Glorify and Magnify Our <u>Wise</u> and <u>Gracious</u> God!
