

# Zeal for God's Name

*1 Samuel 17*

**Introduction:** “‘David and Goliath’ has become a stock phrase for any ‘little guy’ who takes on and defeats a bigger, stronger foe, whether in war, sports, business, or politics.” - Richard Phillips

*1 Peter 5:6-7*

Goliath is called a “champion.” The Hebrew expression means a “man between the two.”

Goliath was approximately 9 feet 6 inches tall.

Goliath’s coat of mail weighed about 126 pounds.

The point of Goliath’s spear weighed about 15 pounds.

The word translated “defy” appears six times in the chapter: 17:10, 25, 26, 36, 45

***Key Truth: When you have a zeal for God’s name you’ll have the perspective, motivation, and courage to fight evil.***

## III. The Courage to Fight Evil
