A Culture of Discipleship

1 Timothy 1:1-2

Introduction: The term "<u>Christian</u>" appears three times in the NT; the term "<u>disciple</u>" appears 246 times in the Gospels and Acts!

"Christ did not come to make <u>Christians</u>; He came to make <u>disciples</u>." - Robby Gallaty

Matthew 28:18-20

"The Great Commission calls us to do more than work to <u>convert</u> people.

It calls us to teach them, to ground them, to help them grow in conformity to Christ. That is our mission." - R.C. Sproul

We are obeying the Great Commission when we come alongside a believer and <u>help</u> them <u>follow</u> Jesus.

Key Truth: One of the most fulfilling aspects of following Christ is helping someone else to follow Christ.

Timothy and Titus were not senior pastors, they were apostolic delegates.

1 Timothy 6:21; 2 Timothy 4:22; Titus 3:15

The main purpose of 1 Timothy can be summarized in three words: guard the truth.

It is your <u>fallenness</u>, not your <u>sanctification</u>, that causes you to rebel against proper authority.

Philippians 2:19-22

I. Discipleship Begins in the Home

Timothy's mother wasn't waiting for someone in the <u>church</u> to teach her son the Scriptures; she took the responsibility upon herself to <u>acquaint</u> her son with God's Word.

Ephesians 6:4

Read and pray with your kids.

II. Discipleship Extends into the **Church**

Timothy genuinely <u>reproduced</u> the spiritual <u>characteristics</u> of Paul.
